A conversation between Kim Welch and Tyrone Freeman, moderated by Yael Sternhell, about their work on modern African-American history and its wider implications in contemporary contexts. The panel will look at the ways in which Black people in the antebellum and Jim Crow eras made legal claims, acquired wealth, and gave generously of their resources to build communities even in the face of extreme racial oppression.

Recontextualizations: exploring the past through traces and artifacts

Moderator: Dr. Christian Fuhrmeister

Participants: Dr. Mirjam Brusius, Nana Oforiatta Ayim, Dr. Natalia Romik

A panel featuring Mirjam Brusius (museum artifacts in global and colonial contexts), Nana Oforiatta Ayim (reconnecting with African ways of historicizing and displaying the past) and Natalia Romik (rediscovering lost Jewish lives in Eastern Europe). It will explore how material traces of the past were preserved, forgotten and erased, or taken out of context, and how those contexts can be researched and possibly recreated. The panel thus illuminates processes of repatriation, recontextualization and rediscovery of objects and sites, including efforts to address dislocation and colonial appropriation, and the attempt to trace hidden places that enabled Jewish survival in times of systematic erasure.
